

- STI rates continue to rise in BC

- Use online technologies to reduce barriers to accessing sexual health care & deliver innovative services






- Provide access to testing for Chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, HIV & hepatitis C via the internet

- Incorporate research & evaluation throughout



Your Tests

We recommend that you test for each of these STIs.

If you do not want a certain test, you can click on the box and remove the check mark. If there is a test that you want but it is not checked, you can click on the box to add the check mark.

When you go to the lab, you will be asked to provide:

- 1. Urine sample. If you are testing for chlamydia and gonorrhea, you will be asked to pee in a cup. Please do not urinate for 2 hours before giving your sample.
- 2. Blood sample. If you are testing for syphilis, HIV and/or hepatitis C, the lab technician will take blood from your arm.



Chlamydia & Gonorrhea

For the most accurate results, it is best to test 2 weeks after possible exposure to chlamydia and 7 days after possible exposure to gonorrhea.



HIV

This is a blood test. For the most accurate results, it is best to test a minimum of **6 weeks** after possible exposure to HIV.



Syphilis

For the most accurate results, it is best to test a minimum of 6 weeks after possible exposure to syphilis.



Hepatitis C

For the most accurate results, it is best to test a minimum of 6 to 10 weeks after possible exposure to hepatitis C.

If you have recently been exposed to HIV...

You indicated that you may have been recently exposed to HIV. If taken within 72 hours, medication can help prevent HIV infection, which is free for some people. Learn more about HIV prevention.

To prevent an unintended pregnancy...

You indicated that you may have recently had unprotected sex that could result in pregnancy for you or your partner. Emergency contraception (morning after pill or ECP) can be taken up to 5 days after sex to prevent pregnancy. You can get ECP from any pharmacy, youth clinic and some STI clinics. It costs about \$40 if you buy it at the pharmacy. Learn more about ECP at Options for Sexual Health and SmartSexResource.

Take your Lab Form to any of the participating LifeLabs locations listed on the right side of this page.

You do not need an appointment but if you want, you can book an appointment online at booking lifelabs.com. You must go to one of the locations listed on this form.

What will happen at the lab?

The lab assistant will ask for your Lab Form. You do not need to show your BC Care Card or other identification.

The lab assistant will call you in using your GetCheckedOnline client code. Please keep the second page of this form so you will know your client code.

The lab assistant will then collect your blood samples for testing and provide instruction for urine collection.

Chlamydia Gonorrhea	Urine sample	You will be asked to pee into a plastic cup. Do not urinate for 2 hours before giving your sample.
HIV Syphilis Hepatitis C	Blood sample	A lab assistant will draw blood from your arm.

Your results will be ready in 7 to 10 days. You will need to log into your GetCheckedOnline account to view your results.





- Engage stakeholders early and broadly
- Established clinical practices should guide development
- Formative research is invaluable
- Health care sector can be very risk averse
- Many challenges to working within government IT infrastructure
- Temper expectations around delivery time!

Conduct formative research



- Client perspectives → Interviews & focus groups with youth, gay men and STI clinic clients
- Provider perspectives

 Focus groups with sexual & reproductive health care providers
- Intention to use internet-based testing → Surveys of BCCDC STI clinic clients and gay / bisexual men across Canada
- Potential to reinforce inequities

 Health equity assessment & recommendations
- Obtaining informed consent → Interviews with potential users of service
